This upcoming fall and spring, the Museum will present lectures by **Steven Ujifusa**, **Prithi Kanakamedala**, and **Ross Perlin**. Past speakers have included notable figures such as Ned Blackhawk, Qian Julie Wang, Jeffrey C. Stewart, Colson Whitehead, Jill Jonnes, and John Turturro.

### The Last Ships from Hamburg

Learn about the mass migration of 2.5 million Jews who fled Eastern Europe between 1890 and 1921 in this conversation with **Steven Ujifusa**. Tracing their journey from Russian shtetls to New York's mansions and labor protests, he weaves together themes of immigration, business, politics, and nativism—offering timely insight into both history and today's refugee crises. The discussion is moderated by **Sarah Henry**, Ph.D., Robert A. and Elizabeth Rohn Jeffe Chief Curator and Deputy Director.

Steven Ujifusa is a historian and author who chronicles the confluence of American business, social, and maritime history.

Prithi Kanakamedala, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor in the History Department at Bronx Community College of the City University of New York (CUNY) where she teaches U.S. History, African American History, and the History of New York City.
